Nevertheless, before we know it, we'll be planning Memorial Day and Fourth of July celebrations. And that means the **Great Plains Lions Leadership Institute (GPLLI)** will be just a few weeks after.

Now is the time to think about enrolling in the great learning opportunity that the GPLLI offers. The return in your investment of time and money is unsurpassed!

This year's event will take place at Northwest Missouri State University, Maryville, Missouri, July 25-27, 2014. **Beverly Nichols** and **VDG Carleen Rajala** from District 17-O will be two of the instructors.

Details:

What? *GPLLI* is an intensive, professional and valuable leadership skills program for Lions who have not served as District Governor. Lions learn skills for club, job, community and church, as well as personal development.

When? July 25-27, 2014. Registration is from 9:00 AM to noon, Friday, July 25. Adjournment and checkout is by 3:00 PM, Sunday, July 27, 2014. Lunch on Friday, July 25 is at 12:00 noon.

Where? Northwest Missouri State University, Maryville, Missouri

Cost? \$150 per attendee if received by the Registrar on or before May 31, 2014. Cost increases to \$170 beginning June 1, 2014. Registration covers double-occupancy room, seven meals, and all course materials. Single occupancy rooms, if available, require an additional \$40. Any remaining costs will be covered by funding from Lions Clubs International and contributions from participating multiple districts.

Who? Any Lion or Lioness (or Leo at least 18 years old) who has not yet served as District Governor as of the dates of the institute is eligible. No previous attendee is eligible without prior approval of the Institute Coordinator.

GPLLI is sponsored by Multiple Districts 5 (Saskatchewan, North Dakota and South Dakota), 9 (Iowa), 17 (Kansas), 26 (Missouri) and 38 (Nebraska).

Dynamic presenters from across the Great Plains will provide emerging Lion leaders with modules on communication skills, team building, delegation, management of change, conflict management, project management, diversity, motivation, public speaking and leading effective meetings.

Learning to Forward Email Messages

Do you really know how to forward e-mails? 50% of us do; 50% do NOT.

Do you wonder why you get viruses or junk mail? Don't you hate it?

Every time you forward an e-mail there is information left over from the people who got the message before you—namely their e-mail addresses and names. As the messages get forwarded along, the list of addresses builds, and builds, and builds, and all it takes is for some poor sap to get a virus, and his or her computer can send that virus to every e-mail address that has come across his computer.

Or, someone can take all of those addresses and sell them or send junk mail to them in the hopes that you will go to the site and he will make five cents for each hit. That's right, all of that inconvenience over a nickel! How do you stop it? Well, there are two easy steps:

1) When you forward an e-mail, DELETE all of the other addresses that appear in the body of the message. That's right—DELETE them. Highlight them, backspace them, cut them—whatever it is you know how to do—then DELETE them. It takes only a second. You MUST, however, click the "Forward" button first. Then you will have full editing capabilities against the body and headers of the message. If you don't click on "Forward" first, you won't be able to edit the message at all.

2) Whenever you send an e-mail to more than one person, do NOT use the "TO:" or "CC:" columns for adding e-mail addresses.

Always use the BCC: (Blind Carbon Copy) column for listing the e-mail addresses. This way the people you send to will see only their own e-mail address.

(If you can't find "BCC," open a new email, click on the "options" tab then click on the "BCC" tab. it will now appear each time you open a new email.)

When you send to BCC: your message will

automatically say "Undisclosed Recipients" in the "TO:" field of the people who receive it.

So please, in the future, let's stop the junk mail and the viruses!

Editor's Note: In addition to our own members, we maintain an extensive list of other Lions as well as friends of our club who receive the Overland Park Host *Lions Roar* by e-mail. Ye Olde Editor has always used the techniques described above when sending the *Roar* by e-mail. This helps prevent addresses from being captured by possible hackers.

Lions International: Knights of the Blind

Janet Campbell hired Hel Director million de

In 1924, The American Foundation for the Blind hired Helen Keller and Annie Sullivan to raise two million dollars for the Helen Keller Endowment. The foundation planned to use the money to help prevent

blindness among children and other related purposes. Helen and Annie took to the road, eventually speaking to 250,000 people at 249 meetings in 123 cities from coast to coast.

One of those speaking engagements was on June 30, 1925, in Cedar Point, Ohio, where Lions members gathered for their 9th annual convention. Helen's voice was not pretty, but her words poured forth with power and precision, "Will you not help me hasten the day when there shall be no preventable blindness; no blind man or woman unaided? I appeal to you Lions, you who have your sight, you who are strong and brave and kind. Will you not constitute yourselves Knights of the Blind in this crusade against darkness?" The Lions heard every word. Before they left Cedar Point, they voted to adopt sight conservation and work for the blind as a major service activity.

In the years to come, Lions pioneered many blindness-related ventures such as the white cane, raised funds for Brailling and sponsored Leader Dog schools. Many have lent their support to radio reading services. The Kansas and Missouri Lions have been a tremendous support to Audio-Reader and many have made a contribution to Audio-Reader as part of their annual budget. The Kansas Lions Sight Foundation financially supports our monthly satellite time, assists with the duplication of our program guides, and has funded many pieces of equipment. It is safe to say that Audio-Reader, as we know it, would not exist without the support of the Lions.

Helen Keller made her last appearance in 1961 at a Lions Club meeting in Washington, but her influence is still alive today. I can't speak for all Lions clubs, but I can say that the Lion members I know accepted that challenge to be Knights of the Blind, and because of that, Audio-Reader flourishes.

We're delighted to feature the Kansas Lions Sight Foundation in this issue of "Airwaves" and we are humbled by their hard work and dedication.



Audio-Reader: Brought to You by The Kansas Lions Sight Foundation

The history and quality of Audio-Reader's radio signal can be divided into two eras: Before the Kansas Lions Sight Foundation (KLSF) and After the Kansas Lions Sight Foundation. That's because before the KLSF began funding the satellite time for the Kansas Lions Sight Foundation Satellite Network, our radio reading coverage was spotty and unreliable. Fortunately for our listeners, our lion-hearted friends have provided funding for this crucial expense for the past 24 years, and we are so grateful for their support.

Audio-Reader's relationship with the KLSF began in 1990, after a satellite had been purchased to improve our radio signal. The new equipment came with a huge expense: satellite time, which costs approximately \$16,000 per year. Ellen Unruh, the Outreach Coordinator at the time, approached the KLSF at the Kansas Lions Mid-Winter Rally and they agreed to fund the satellite time for one year only. "They made it clear that it was a one-time deal," said Janet Campbell, Audio-Reader's Executive Director.

One year later, Janet decided that she had to approach the KLSF and ask them to fund the satellite time once again. "We had already made the commitment in the form of equipment," said Janet "we couldn't turn back now." Janet was pregnant with her third child and due in early February. She prayed that she would go into labor after the January Mid-Winter Rally meeting. No such luck – her son Max was born on January 13 and 6 days later, Janet drove to Salina, KS to present to the KLSF. "It was that important to me, and to Audio-Reader," she said.

Her sacrifice paid off - the KLSF agreed to fund the satellite time for another year, and they have continued to do so until this day.

"We've never taken it for granted," said Janet "We know it's a lot of money, and they work hard to raise it, and we are so grateful. Especially when there are so many other worthy organizations asking for support."

Current KLSF President Gene Vogel says that the foundation "continues to fund the program since it reaches many sight-impaired individuals." In addition to providing coverage to our own listeners in Kansas and Missouri, the satellite allows



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Audio-Reader to share programs with 18 other radio reading services across the US.

In recent years, the KLSF has increased funding to include support for the Large Print and Braille program guides - tools that provide vision-impaired listeners with access to our program schedule.

Total giving for the past 24 years totals nearly half a million dollars, making the KLSF one of Audio-Reader's most generous supporters.

Formed in 1965, the KLSF

has initiated a number of projects focusing on health and low-vision care. Their first project was the rehabilitation of the Department of Ophthalmology at Kansas University Medical Center. Funds for the foundation are provided by Lions Clubs across Kansas, who raise money by selling candy and holding fund-raisers.

Two decades after that first visit in 1990, attending the Lions Mid-Winter Rally in Salina has become an Audio-Reader tradition, and presenting to the foundation is like visiting with old friends who have Audio-Reader's best interests at heart. The KLSF is one of many reasons why Audio-Reader loves the Lions, and they are *the* reason that Audio-Reader is one of the premier radio-reading services in the country. We are so grateful for their generosity and we hope they know the impact their efforts have on those we serve.

Kansas Lions Sight Foundation Projects Provided by KLSF President Gene Vogel

MOBILE SCREENING UNIT

A traveling clinic featuring screening stations for hearing, visual acuity, peripheral vision, blood sugar and blood pressure. Funds for the most recent trailer were provided by the Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Kansas Foundation.

USED EYEGLASSES

Used eyeglasses are collected and provided for Kansas VOSH (an organization that provides vision care worldwide) on trips to Central and South America. The foundation collects approximately 150,000 pair per year.

KANLUVKIDS

A low-vision initiative that provides care to children in Kansas who do not live near or cannot afford specialized care. The project is made possible by the first Sight First low vision grant and has helped equip 10 regional clinics, a mobile outreach program, and a number of public education activities.

CHILD SCREENING

The foundation is involved in ensuring that pre-school children receive eye screening.

HEARTLAND EYE BANKS

Kansas Lions help organize donor registration drives for the Heartland Eye Banks, a collaboration between KS, MO and IL Lions. The program provides hundreds of cornea transplants to Kansans each year.
