Armed Forces Day coming up . . .

First Flag Raisings Set for May 17, 24

Mark your calendars now! Our first "Flag Day" this year is coming up soon. Armed Forces Day is on Saturday, May 17. We will raise flags at 6 AM and lower them at 5 PM on the same day.

Memorial Day is the next holiday to be observed. Flags will go up at 6 AM on Saturday, May 24 and come down at 6 AM on Tuesday, May 27.

Your help, as always, is needed on each date to ensure a quick and successful fulfillment of this traditional activity

May 24 is also a regular-meeting day, making it all the more important to have a good-sized crew setting up flags. We need be at Perkins on time for breakfast and program. We will have a remembrance of deceased members of our club that day.

Lion Lynn Wolfe is chairman of the Flag Operations committee again this year.

<u>Coming Up</u>: We'll honor Flag Day with flags up at 6 AM on Saturday, June 14 and down at 5 PM, same day). For Independence Day flags will go up on Saturday June 28 and come down on Saturday July 5.

TARGET: 100 Active Members by 2017, 100th Anniversary of Lions Club Int'l.

A challenge for you: Visualize how much more service our club could provide to the Overland Park area if we had 100 really active members. Currently we have 47 members, of whom about 25 are regularly involved in activities.

The goal: 100 by 100 = 100 members by the 100th anniversary of Lions Clubs International.

Increasing our club's membership to that level by June 30, 2017 is a challenge presented to the Board of Directors at its May 3 meeting.

An initial step will be a mailing to a fairly large number of Overland Park residents inviting them to an informational meeting, probably on the third Saturday morning in July (*at a location other than Perkins Restaurant*). Follow-up telephone calls will reinforce the mailing and repeat the invitation.

The effort is based on the highly successful "**Just Ask**" program created a few years ago by two Lions in Australia. The program has worked so well there that Australia is the only English-speaking country in the world where membership is increasing. So many new clubs have been formed that Australia has increased its number of districts, rather than the decreases that are so common elsewhere—including here in Kansas.

"100 x 100" will not be an exclusive effort on our club's part, although the idea originated here. **Council Chairperson Beverly Nichols** presented it to next year's District Governors, who wholeheartedly adopted it for each district. One governor-elect said, "This will show that we're all in this together!"

An on-going Lions district project . . . Are You Saving Pop-Can Tabs to Help Ronald McDonald House?

Did you know . . . ? The tabs for opening aluminum beverage containers (soft drinks, beer, etc.) are used to benefit **Ronald McDonald Houses**.

From the Ronald McDonald House web site:



A Ronald McDonald House is that "home-away-from-home" for families so they can stay close by their hospitalized child at little or no cost.

Our Houses are built on the simple idea that nothing else should matter when a family is focused on the health of their child—not where they can afford to stay, where they will get their next meal or where they will lay their head at night to rest. We believe that when a child is

hospitalized the love and support of family is as powerful as the strongest medicine prescribed.

Look at it this way: snowflakes don't amount to much by themselves, but when they stick together it takes a bulldozer to move them. In the same way, each aluminum tab is very small and light, but when they're collected by Lions and Lions' friends, the total weight raises a lot of money for Ronald McDonald houses.

So . . . when you recycle that aluminum can, snap off the tab from the top first. Bring your saved tabs with you to club meetings. We'll make certain that they get delivered to **PDG Bob Slapar**, our district Environmental Committee chairperson. He delivers them to Kansas City Ronald McDonald Houses.

These aluminum tabs are sent to Detroit or other automobile-manufacturing centers, when they are melted down for using in making engine blocks. The metal in the tabs is heavier and of better quality than the aluminum in the rest of the can.

And a final note: tabs from tin cans (such as for vegetables, fruit, juice, etc.) are *not* usable, so please don't include them with the aluminum tabs from beverage cans.

Leos Awareness and Leadership Summit

April was Leo Club Awareness Month. Lions Clubs need young people, and Leos are a great way to introduce them to Lions. Our *club* might find future Lions if we sponsored a Leo Club.

Lions Clubs International invites all Lions to attend a Leo Lion Summit at the International Convention in Toronto in July. The summit brings together Leos and Lions from around the world to share experiences, and learn about exciting new resources. Remember, we raise flags at 6 AM on May 24. Please try to get the flags on your route posted as quickly as possible so you can arrive at the meeting on time.
