Learning to protect against hackers . . . Create stronger passwords to protect your computer data and your identify



Shelley White of BDS, a local information technology company, was guest speaker on July 25. Shelley, shown in picture at left with **Big Lion Mike Orzechowski**, presented several techniques for protecting computers from being hacked and the

avoiding the problems that stem from hacking. She spent a lot of time discussing how to construct strong passwords, ones that are hard to decipher.

A strong password will have five characteristics. It will . . .

- be at least eight characters in length;
- contain both upper-case and lower-case letters;
- contain at least one numeral and one special character (&, #, \$, !, ^, etc.);
- NOT be a dictionary word;
- will be hard to guess and to remember.


Finally, Shelley said, you shouldn't use the same password for multiple accounts and you should change your passwords at least every ninety days.

Answering the audience's "groan" reaction to the last two ideas, Shelley pointed out that there are trade-offs a computer user must make. There is the convenience of simple passwords used on several accounts OR the higher security that comes from using a separate complicated password for each account and changing it often. There cannot be an equal balance of convenience and safety.

Another useful tip that Shelley provided had to do with security questions such as "What is your mother's name?" or "Where did you grow up?" Answers to these don't have to be truthful, she said. As an example, when "What is your father's name?" is used as a security question in one of her accounts, she answers, "The Declaration of Independence."

A brisk question-and-answer period followed the main part of Shelley's presentation.

#### **District 17-A Harvesters Work Night**



## Annual Sale Supports KU Audio-Reader "For Your EARS Only" benefit sale to be September 11, 12 in Lawrence

"For Your EARS Only," an annual event to help raise operating funds for the KU-Audio-Reader service, will be held on September 11 and 12 at the Douglas County Fairgrounds in Lawrence.

Last year's sale grossed nearly \$28,500, the largest amount ever raised.

Hundreds of people usually



turn out on both Friday and Saturday to check out sale items. The inventory contains vinyl records, CDs, DVDs, Audio-Books and many musical instruments. In 2014 even a didgeridoo was sale. Over 300 pieces of vintage and modern equipment, including turntables, receivers, amplifiers, speakers and an early 20th century crank-up phonograph were sold last year.

All items sold are donated by Lawrence, Kansas City and Topeka residents. With the help of many volunteers, all items get cleaned, sorted, priced and put out for customers.

The sale raises crucial operating funds for Audio-Reader and helps cover costs associated with print materials and technology needed to provide free reading and information services to thousands of listeners.

OPHLC members: if you're thinking of putting old CDs, vinyl records, or audio equipment into garage sales or even—gasp—throwing them away, consider donating to the For Your EARS Only sale. Audio-Reader will raise far more money by selling your items then you would get at a garage sale. Beyond helping KU Audio-Reader, if you itemize on your income tax returns, you can claim deductions for the value of the items you donate.
